
## GENESIS COMMUNITY

In September, Alexander Asmah travelled from Ghana to the US to present at the **BAM323 Conference** on the campus of Lipscomb University in Nashville, TN. Alex is currently a full time lecturer (faculty member) for Heritage Christian College in Accra. He received his masters in Informations Systems from the University of Ghana, and has recently finished his Phd. in Information Systems from the University in Cape Town, South Africa. Alex is married to Juliet and they have two young boys, Kenneth and Kwaku, ages 5 and 2.



Alex was working as a certified accountant at a major bank in Accra , as well as an adjunct teacher for GIMPA (Ghana Institute of Management and Public Administration) when Dr. Williams Atuilik, Provost for Heritage Christian College, invited Alex to come to HCC and join them as a lecturer. So, Alex has been with HCC from the beginning and is very excited to now see the first graduating class at HCC ready to enter into a new phase of their young lives.
